When Storm Clouds Roll Does Your Dog Search for a Hole?

Bentley, aka "the sheriff," is hailed by his family as the most fearless dog in the county. This mighty Jack Russell Terrier protects his loved ones like the Secret Service guards the president. Alert and alw ays on the lookout for trouble, he is ready to respond at a moment's notice. That is, at least, on a sunny day. The instant Bentley hears the first clap of thunder, the brave security guard cow ers and runs for cover.

Astraphobia, the abnormal fear of thunder and lightning, is common in dogs. Symptoms include pacing, panting, whining, and anxiousness. Some dogs may become clingy while others search for a place to hide.

When dogs exhibit these symptoms, pet parents often feel compelled to try to console them; how ever, this action can actually reinforce the dog's fearful behavior. Here are a few things to try that may help ease a pet's nervousness:

- Remain calm around the dog and act normally
- Turn on the TV or radio or provide some kind of w hite noise
- Provide a safe hiding spot such as a covered open crate or a soft bed in a small interior room
- Provide a snug compression garment (such as a ThunderShirt or Storm Defender)
- Consult your veterinarian, especially for severe cases

What works for one dog will not necessarily work for another. Talk with your veterinarian about your dog's symptoms.

Bentley's family tried several options but found the most effective for him w as to place a soft bed in the window less laundry room and w ash a load of clothes. The noise of the w asher and dryer plus shelter in an interior room soothed his symptoms. When thunder rolls, he now heads straight for the laundry room w here he can relax w hile the storm passes.




